
THE ZAMBEZI SOCIETY'S HISTORICAL SERIES. EPISODE 2: THE ZAMSOC LOGO

EPISODE 2: THE ZAMSOC LOGO



Once we'd formed The Zambezi Society, in 1982, we realised that it needed a visual identity. Our small founder group met to create a Logo "by committee".

This didn't take long, once we were fortified with a bit of alcohol. "What" we asked ourselves, "sums up the Zambezi Valley?" Someone said 'the river". Someone else said "the mountains"; and someone else again said "elephants". Suggestions such as paperthorns, and collapsing longdrops were dismissed. We knocked out a rough, had it redrawn professionally, and the result served us well for many years.

It has been given a facelift recently, in the interests of stylistic fashion, but – we're delighted to say – still retains those three vital core components. It also retains the holistic, trans-boundary

element so essential to the conservation of the Zambezi landscape. Elephants know no boundaries...and, although Zamsoc's activities may at times be narrowed in focus due to funding constraints, our vision remains valley-wide.
